This seminar will focus on the process of counseling from a Christian perspective. We will also explore the way one can lead clients toward reconciling broken relationships, understanding the process of healing their wounds, and experiencing hope for their hearts in order to continue co-writing their life stories.

Objectives

- Understand the paradigm of creation, fall, and redemption in the context of three relationships: self, others and God.
- Gain new skills of learning techniques and insights into Scripture and the way to use the counsel of God to impact the personal stories of clients.
- Develop a new appreciation for how to use stories of scripture to help others find hope and healing.
- Learn new ways for personal soul care while continuing to enter into the "pig pens" of other people's hearts.
- Experience the gospel story on a new personal level that will impact the way one counsels and relates to others in this broken world.

Ethics for Mental Health Professionals

Description

This continuing education course will address many ethical issues that mental health providers encounter in treatment, including concerns related to the increased use of technology. This course will also address the legal issues that mental health professionals may encounter and how they can maintain their ethical responsibilities while complying with legal demands. There will also be a focus on how ethical guidelines can sometimes conflict with clinical appropriateness.

Objectives

- Participants will increase understanding of the ethical issues that can arise when there is legal involvement in treatment.
- Participants will feel more confident in responding in situations where there is a divergence between clinical and ethical appropriateness.
- Participants will understand how the growing use of technology both in and out of treatment can impact treatment both ethically and clinically.
